

Glendale Finally Gets Historic I-75 Sign

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Glendale has been working with the Ohio Dept. of Transportation for many years to obtain brown sign designation on northbound and southbound I-75. These large brown signs designate many things, including public places, historic areas and destinations. Glendale is a National Historic Landmark and only a few National Landmarks are in the Cincinnati area.

Unfortunately, ODOT had to deny past brown sign applications because Glendale did not have sufficient expressway visitors to qualify. Glendale persisted and continued to request the unique destination signs, but each request was turned down.

But State Representative Jim Raussen heard of Glendale's many attempts, became involved, and within several months ODOT sorted out the requirements and agreed to include HISTORIC GLENDALE brown signs on I-75. These two large signs now share the sign posts with the brown Sharonville Convention Center signs and are located on I-75 just before the northbound and southbound ramps to exit 15.

Mayor Joseph Hubbard said "Glendale's Administration has been persistent in working to obtain these signs and we appreciate the assistance rendered by Representative Raussen to finally make our brown sign project a reality". Mayor Hubbard added "within the historic district we have many tourist attractions and destinations, including exceptional dining in historic restaurants, a walking tour and our Glendale Heritage Preservation museum. Expressway travelers will now know that there is yet another reason to take exit 15. "
